## NON-UNIFORM STUDENT DRESS POLICY

## POLICY STATEMENT

In Judaism, there is a set of laws that are categorized under the heading of "tzniut". The closest English definition for tzniut is "modesty". Modest & dignified dress is expected of all students on non-uniform days and when attending school or school-sponsored activities.

## REGULATIONS

Students who are deemed by staff to be improperly dressed may be required to change, or be sent home. The Head of School-Principal shall be the final arbiter of the school non-uniform dress policy.

Situations may arise in which health and/or safety concerns result in temporary modifications of the non-uniform dress policy. The appropriate staff and/or administrator will make these changes before the activity takes place (e.g. field trips, lab classes, physical education classes, art classes, options, special events, etc.).

- 1. The bottom of the shirt must reach the top of the pants at all times; the midriff must be covered. Undergarments must not be visible.
- 2. Shirts should have modest necklines. Sleeveless tops are acceptable as long as they are not 'cutaway', spaghetti straps, racer-back or strapless. Undergarments, including bra straps, must not be visible.
- 3. The length of skirts, dresses and shorts must be modest. Very short shorts are not acceptable. Modesty shorts are encouraged under skirts.
- 4. Toques and hats must not be worn inside the building, with the exception of *kippot*.
- 5. Clothing and accessories may not have references to tobacco, alcohol, profanity, violence, and anything illegal as well as sexually suggestive slogans or pictures.
- 6. Gym strip is required on non-uniform days unless outlined by the Physical Education staff.
- 7. It is recommended that students bring suitable footwear to be worn on the playground and not wear the same footwear outside as they are wearing inside.
